THE FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA)

The FAFSA is the form students and their families fill out to apply for all sorts of government grants and loans. Applying is free, and aid is awarded to most students ranging from those with demonstrated financial need to students with a record of high achievement as well as those who might need some federal loan assistance.
