APPLYING FOR **ADMISSION**

For admission and scholarship purposes, you're considered a transfer student if you've completed any college-level coursework after high school graduation. This includes technical or vocational credit and anything above remedial-level coursework.

Transfer students are expected to have been in good academic standing at all previous institutions. You're a strong candidate for admission if you have the following:

- A minimum of 24 college-level credit hours
- A cumulative 2.4 GPA or higher from all institutions attended

Students with fewer than 24 credits or less than a 2.4 cumulative GPA from all previous institutions are encouraged to apply. Any negative grade trends or failing grades should be explained in a personal statement. If transfer students have fewer than 24 college-level credit hours, high school academics will also be taken into consideration.

Note: College credit earned during high school may count toward a UNC degree but cannot classify you as a transfer student.

No portion of an applicant's previous collegiate record can be omitted. Students who fail to list all institutions previously attended may forfeit admission to UNC and/or student conduct regulations may apply.

HOW TO APPLY

1 Application. You can apply through the Bear App (unco.edu/apply) or Common App (apply.commonapp.org).

2 \$50 application fee. This is nonrefundable and payable by credit or debit card (fee waivers are available).

3 Official transcripts from all previous institutions.

Transcripts can be submitted:

- Via mail to UNC Office of Admissions, Campus Box 10, Greeley, CO 80639
- Via Parchment.com
- Via email, from the institution, to UNC.transcripts@unco.edu
- Via other electronic service your previous institution may use

4 Other materials as needed.

- If you are transferring with 23 or fewer credit hours (not counting AP, IB or CLEP credits), you need to submit your high school transcript or equivalent, as well as your ACT or SAT test scores.
- If you are transferring with 24 or more credit hours (not counting AP, IB or CLEP credits), you need to submit proof of high school graduation for federal financial aid reasons. This can be a high school transcript, diploma, GED or other high school graduation equivalent.
- If you have an associate's or bachelor's degree, you do not need to submit any high school or test score documentation.
- If you do not meet the admission criteria (listed to the left), we recommend that you submit a personal statement. There is no specific prompt, but we recommend about 300 words, and you may want to describe your situation and how you have prepared to succeed at UNC.



TIMING YOUR APPLICATION

Begin the application process early in the semester before you plan to start.



FALL START

- Submit application, transcript(s) and supporting materials as soon as possible, up to one year in advance.
- Applications will be considered on a space-available basis until August 1.
- Don't miss financial aid deadlines. The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is open starting October 1, and the priority deadline is March 1 (see page 6).
- Students must be admitted by June 1 for admission-based scholarship consideration and in order to complete the UNC Scholarship Application.



SPRING START

- Submit application, transcript(s) and supporting materials as soon as possible, up to one year in advance.
- Applications will be considered on a space-available basis until December 1.
- Don't miss financial aid deadlines.
- Apply by November 1 to be considered for admission-based scholarships.

TRANSFEROLOGY™

Transferology is an online tool you can use to find out if your coursework will transfer to UNC. Knowing how your courses will transfer can save you money and help you graduate on time.

REGISTERING FOR CLASSES

There are two options for transfer and nontraditional student advising:

- 2 Attend our on-campus Transfer and Nontraditional Welcome.

Online Orientation (required)

Before students are allowed to register for classes, an online orientation is required for all transfer and nontraditional students to introduce student essentials and resources. After being admitted into UNC, the link to online orientation is sent to each student's BearMail.

Transfer and Nontraditional Welcome (optional)

Transfer and nontraditional students are also encouraged to attend an optional three-hour Transfer and NonTraditional Welcome, which provides an overview of life at UNC. It is a convenient time for students to connect with other students, meet with an advisor and register for classes.

EXPLORING FINANCIAL AID

UNC offers financial assistance through loans, grants, work-study and scholarships.

FAFSA

Every student should complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA is a required application for a wide range of financial aid, including need-based grants, loans, work-study and some UNC scholarships.

FOR FINANCIAL AID CONSIDERATION

- You should be admitted to UNC by March 1
- The 2019–20 FAFSA is available beginning October 1, 2018 – use your completed 2017 tax information to complete the 2019-20 FAFSA
- Complete the FAFSA at fafsa.gov
- Use UNC's school code: **001349**

COLLEGE OPPORTUNITY FUND (COF)

If you're a Colorado resident and haven't already done so, you should apply for the College Opportunity Fund stipend now. The COF was established by the Colorado legislature to help offset the cost of college for Colorado residents. If you don't apply for the stipend, you'll pay the full resident tuition rate. Register online at collegeincolorado.org.

HEALTH INSURANCE: You're required to either have an acceptable health insurance plan or to purchase the UNC student health plan. If you're enrolled in a comparable plan, you'll need to request a waiver for UNC's health plan at the beginning of each year you are enrolled at UNC.



WESTERN UNDERGRADUATE EXCHANGE (WUE) RESIDENT TUITION

Students from a WUE state automatically save more than \$5,000 in tuition costs each year with the WUE program.

To automatically receive the WUE tuition rates, you must be a permanent resident of one of the following states: Alaska, Arizona, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington or Wyoming.

The WUE tuition rate is automatically offered and applies to all terms — fall, interim, spring and summer — and to part-time and full-time enrollment. It isn't applied for programs and courses offered through the Office of Extended Campus, as Extended Campus has separate tuition rates.

Your application for admission also serves as your application for WUE tuition and admission-based scholarships. In addition, you may submit the UNC Scholarship Application to be considered for other scholarships.

Note: Students cannot qualify for in-state residency after attending UNC as a WUE student. One would need to decline WUE and pay non-resident tuition for one year before establishing in-state residency.



APPLYING FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

Your application for admission serves as your application for admission-based scholarships.

Submit the UNC Scholarship Application to be considered for other scholarships. There are scholarships available with this application through June 1; however, many have March 1 deadlines.

APPLICATION CRITERIA

- You must be an admitted student to complete the UNC Scholarship Application, which is available on your Ursa account.
- You must be enrolled in at least 12 credit hours each semester to qualify for scholarships.
- These scholarships are awarded to students who are working on their first bachelor's degree program.
- Students in off-campus, cash-funded programs are not eligible for institutional scholarships and should check with Extended Campus regarding scholarship opportunities.

ADMISSION-BASED SCHOLARSHIPS

These scholarships are awarded automatically shortly after admission if you meet the requirements.

UNC's housing options offer an apartment-style vibe, great amenities and close access to classes.



ON-CAMPUS LIVING

By living on campus, you'll build a support system, get involved, and be among the first to know about social events, sporting competitions, campus concerts and more.

- Select a residential learning community that reflects your academic goals or interests, such as our pet friendly residence hall, biology learning community or transfer community.
- Living units include cable, electricity, internet and laundry; lounges with flat-screen TVs; fully equipped community kitchens; study spaces; music practice rooms and more.
- On-campus housing information is sent to you after you're admitted. Options for transfer students include residence halls and apartments.

To secure on-campus housing, submit your enrollment deposit and complete the online contract available at unco.edu/housing with your \$100 deposit as soon as possible once you're admitted.

STUDENT LIVE-ON-CAMPUS REQUIREMENT. All newly admitted students with fewer than 20 transferable college credit hours earned after high school graduation (or equivalent), who are under 21 and not living with their legal guardian in the local area, are required to live in the university's residence halls through the completion of the first academic year of their attendance. Credits earned through Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), College-Level Examination Program (CLEP) or concurrent enrollment with high school do not apply toward the live-on requirement.

DINING ON CAMPUS

Whether you're living on or off campus, you'll have access to chef-prepared meals, healthy options on the go and a wide range of retail dining choices. If you choose to live in a campus residence hall (besides Lawrenson), you're required to have a meal plan, and if you live off campus, you can choose to purchase an off-campus option.



Go to unco.edu/dining to look up dining room menus, check nutrition labels for UNC meal items, consult with UNC's dietitian and find out about annual special events such as Taste of UNC or Thanksgiving Brunch.

DINING DOLLARS

Part of your meal plan includes Dining Dollars, which are loaded onto your UNC ID card. You'll use your Dining Dollars for food and beverages at campus retail food locations such as Munchy Mart or Subway® by swiping your card. Any UNC student can also purchase Dining Dollars in \$25 increments.

CAMPUS MAP

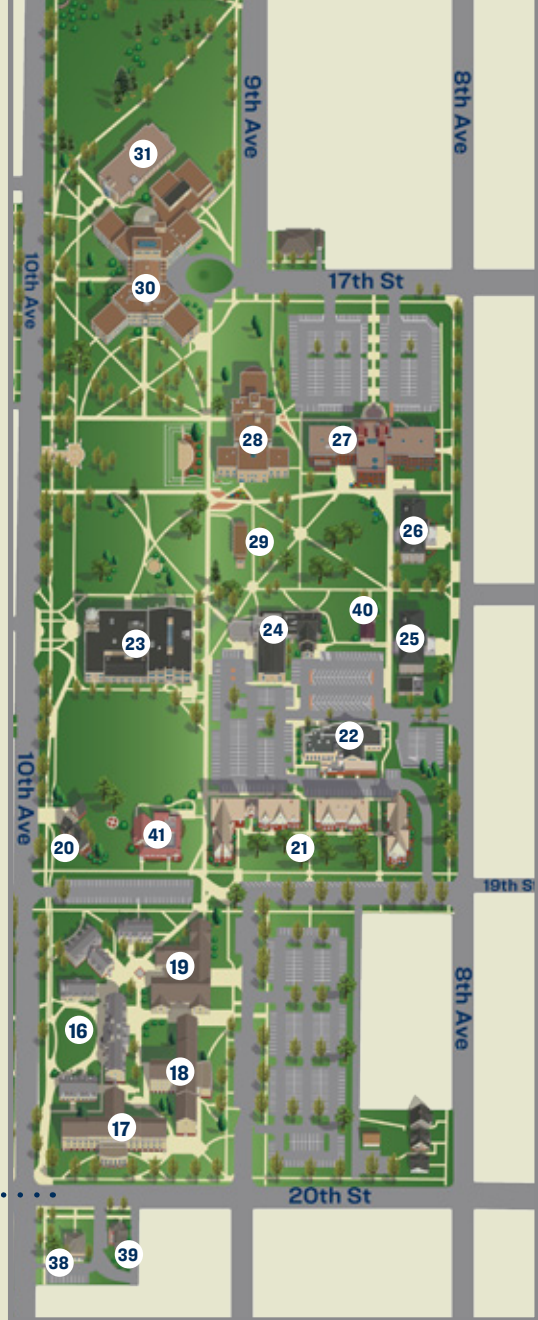
WANT TO LIVE WITH PEOPLE WITH SIMILAR INTERESTS?

UNC offers themed housing that includes a women's community, a transfer community, a gender inclusive community and a pet friendly community. You can also choose from more than a dozen residential learning communities where you can live, study and network with people in your major or interest area.

PLANNING AHEAD

If you'll be under the age of 21, transferring fewer than 20 credit hours and not living with a parent or guardian locally, you'll live on campus at UNC.
